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## The State of the Union Address 2012

#### The US Constitution states: **"The President shall from time to** time give to Congress information of the State of the Union ...." <u>The Constitution</u>, Article II, Section 3.

As ordered by the Constitution, President Barack Obama is set to give the annual State of the Union speech at 9:00 pm on Tuesday, January 24, 2012. The U.S. Constitution <u>requires</u> the President to report regularly to Congress. The televised <u>address</u> will give the President a chance to share his plans before the nation and its citizens. When President Obama walks into the <u>Capitol Building</u> to <u>deliver</u> his State of the Union speech, millions of American viewers will be watching. It is a <u>unique</u> moment for the President to speak to the public on a <u>variety</u> of topics, including the economy, foreign policy, education, boosting tourism and job creation.

Each year, the president usually spends many hours preparing for the speech. The US Sergeant at Arms, who is responsible for <u>protocol</u> in Congress, announces the presence of the President. Then, the president enters the Congress chamber to a <u>standing ovation</u>.

President Barack Obama will stand before the House of Representatives and the Senate members. Behind him, the Senate President (U.S. Vice President) Joe Biden and House Speaker John Boehner will be seated.

Sitting near the front of the chamber will be the <u>Justices</u> of the Supreme Court and members of the <u>Cabinet</u>. <u>Traditionally</u>, one cabinet member does not attend, in order to make sure someone would be available to lead the nation in the event that a <u>catastrophe</u> disables the President, the Vice President, and others. This <u>designated</u> **survivor** is a member of the <u>United States Cabinet</u> who is appointed to be at a physically distant location when the <u>president</u> and the country's other top leaders (e.g., vice president, secretary of state) are gathered at a single location.

After greeting the attendees, the President hands copies of the speech to the Vice President of the United States and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Once the Congress quiets down after the President's arrival, the President then delivers the speech from the podium.

After he is finished, the President will visit several states and many Americans will react to the speech with questions and comments.
