## US FLAG FACTS: By Najwa Badawi

The United States flag has 50 stars and 13 stripes. Since 1960, the U.S. flag contains 50 white stars on a field of blue and 13 red and white stripes ( 7 red stripes and 6 white stripes). The 50 stars represent the 50 states of the U.S., and the 13 stripes represent the 13 original colonies.

The flag has been changed many times over the years. New stars were added each time new states joined the Union. Alaska and Hawaii became states in 1959, making them the last two states to join the Union?

The United States flag is red, white, and blue: red represents courage; white represents purity or goodness; and blue represents justice.

George Washington, our first president said, " We take the stars from Heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing Liberty."

June $14^{\text {th }}$ is Flag Day in America. On that day, Americans proudly display the US flag. When displayed,

- Never allow the flag to touch the ground or floor.
- The flag should never be used to carry, store, or deliver anything.

Betsy Ross was asked to sew the first flag of the United States of America.
