#### **Understanding your taxes**

In this lesson we are going to learn how to file a 1040EZ tax return.

You will need:

Your W2, a copy of any interest you earned, Form 1040EZ, and a 2011 Tax Table.

When you work there is money taken out of (deducted from) your paycheck for federal, state, and local taxes. Each year, individuals must report the information about their wages and/or income earned to the government. Different forms are needed for the different filings. For example, there are forms for federal taxes, forms for state taxes, and forms for local taxes. Information about your income must be completed and filed by April 15<sup>th</sup>.



Besides income tax, there are many other kinds of taxes that we pay such as sales tax, property taxes, capital gains tax, and more.

April 15<sup>th</sup> is the deadline date for the three main taxes (depending on your state) that individuals must file each. These are the Federal, State, and Local taxes. For the year 2011, the deadline has been changed to April 17.

Almost everyone who works must file taxes. If you are not sure, then contact the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

Your status as an alien—resident, nonresident, or dual-status—determines whether and you must file an income tax return.

The rules used to determine your alien status are discussed in Publication 519, U.S. Tax.

**Resident alien.** If you are a resident alien for the entire year, you must file a tax return following the same rules that apply to U.S. citizens. Use the forms discussed in this publication.

**Nonresident alien.** If you are a nonresident alien, the rules and tax forms that apply to you are different from those that apply to U.S. citizens and resident aliens. See Publication 519 to find out if U.S. income tax laws apply to you and which forms you should file.

If you are not sure if you have to file taxes, then check with a tax attorney, your immigration officer, or contact the IRS.

#### **Important Terms**

- W-4 Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate This is the form an employer gives to an employee when they are hired. The information on the W-4 includes the employee's name, address, marital status, and dependents. The employer uses the information on this form to withhold part of your paycheck each pay period.
- **W-2 Wage and Tax Statement** This form is sent to you by the end of January each year by your employer. It is a statement of your wages/earning for the previous calendar year. The information found on it is used to calculate your income tax.
- **1040EZ 1040A 1040** These are various kinds of tax return forms used to file your income tax to the federal government.
- **File** to mail or transmit to the IRS Service Center taxpayer's information about income and tax liability.
- **VITA** Volunteer Income Tax Assistance these centers are available to individuals who need help filing their taxes.
- **Transmit** to send (file) electronically
- **Refund** The money the taxpayer overpaid during the year that will be sent to them by the government.
- **Direct Deposit** This allows tax refunds to be deposited directly tol the taxpayer's Bank account. You must have an established checking or savings account to have your refund deposited directly.
- **IRS** Internal Revenue Service the government agency responsible for collecting taxes.
- **PIN** Personal Identification Number this allows taxpayers to "sign: their tax returns electronically. This PIN ensures that electronically submitted tax returns are authentic.
- **Social Security Number** number assigned to an individual that is used on a W-4.
